### AIMS AND PURPOSES OF SCHOOL CHOICE

#### **EDUCATIONAL INTEREST**

- Improve student achievement
- Promote diversity
- Expand parental involvement in education

#### FINANCIAL INTEREST

Attempt to control net cost-per-station

#### **IDEOLOGICAL INTEREST**

- Privatize the largest, costliest activity of state government
- Use market approach to improve government service

### SCHOOL CHOICE IN FLORIDA

School choice broadly describes any means by which parents may have some meaningful role in determining which school their child attends.

Parents in Florida may select or seek enrollment via several school choice models including:

- District-operated schools (including magnet schools)
- Charter schools (including Schools of Hope)
- Private and religious schools
- Scholarship/voucher schools
- Home schools

### **Hope Scholarship Account**

 Students who are bullied may attend another public or private school.

### **Opportunity Scholarship**

 Students in "F" schools may transfer to a higher-performing public school.

### Reading Scholarship Account

 Students with low reading scores may receive \$500 toward curriculum, tutoring, etc.

### OTHER CHOICES

### Magnet schools or programs

Themed schools or programs that promote diversity in schools.

### **Military Family Choice**

 Special option for military families to receive a McKay scholarship.

### **Controlled Open Enrollment**

 Option to choose any public school with open seats anywhere in the state.
