2026 Legislative Session Overview

- **Regular Session:**
 - January 13, 2026, through March 13, 2026
 - 1,896 bills were filed
 - 1,691 bills had the potential to affect public education, local educators, students and/or parents
 - 192 general bills passed both chambers
 - 23 education-related bills passed both chambers
- **Special Session D (Congressional Redistricting)**
 - April 28, 2026, through May 1, 2026
- **Special Session E (Budget)**
 - May 12, 2026, through May 29, 2026.
- **Special Session F (Property Tax Relief)**
 - June 1, 2026, through June 3, 2026

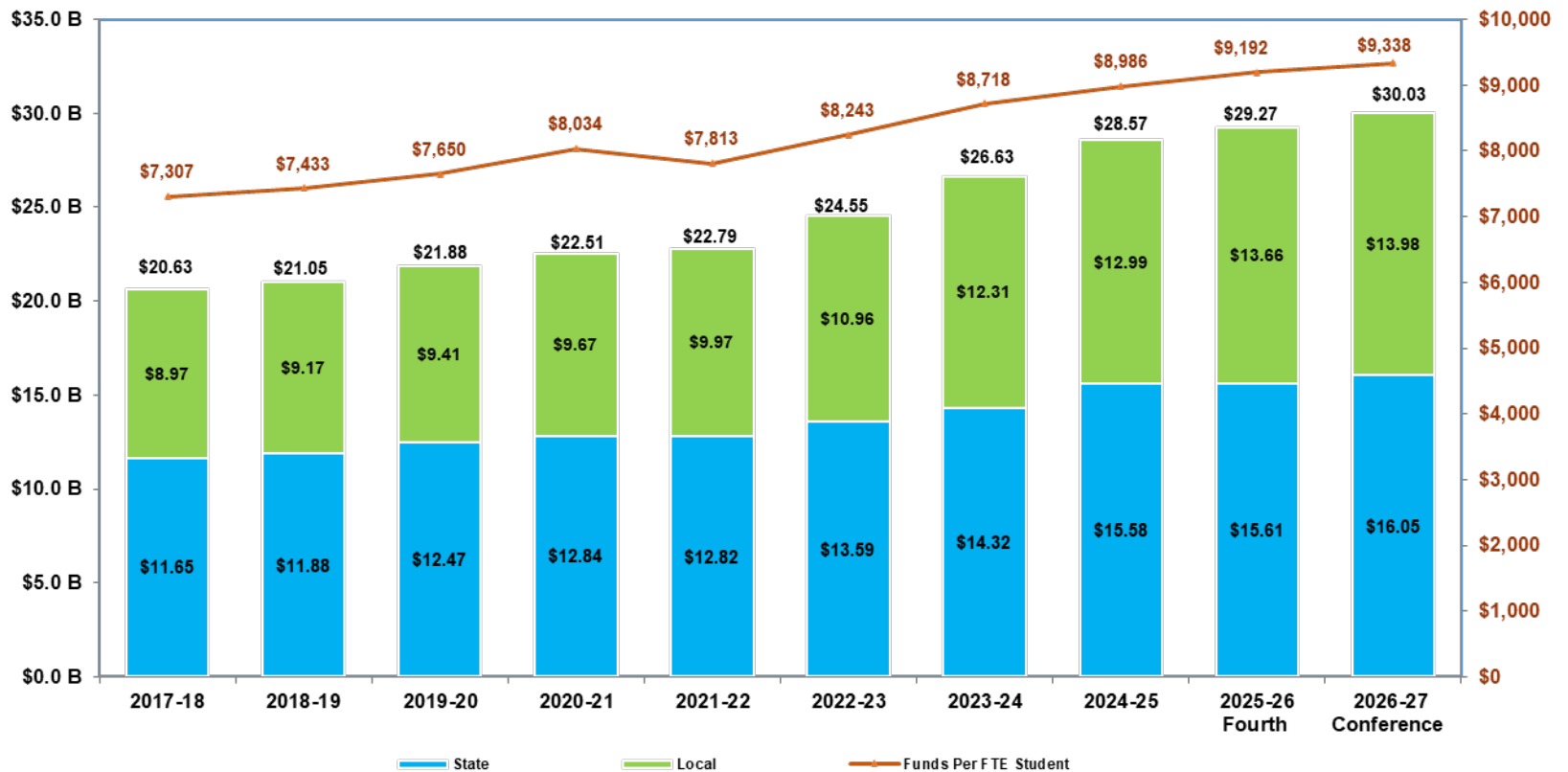

FEFP – Total Funding



K-12 Public Schools 2026-27 Highlights for FEFP

- Per student funding of \$9,337.67, an increase of \$145.18 per FTE.
- \$85 increase in the Base Student Allocation.
- \$736 million increase in total FEFP funds.
- Lowers the Required Local Effort millage rate to 3.057, a decrease of 0.035 mills.
- Revisions to the Education Enrollment Stabilization Program.

Classroom Teacher and Other Instructional Personnel Salary Increase

- \$1.56 billion, an increase of \$201.3 million, for the Classroom Teacher and Other Instructional Personnel Salary Increase Allocation.
- These funds were previously rolled into the Base Funding Allocation in 2023-24.
- 7.14 percent of Base Funding to maintain increases given in previous years.
- 1.06 percent to raise the minimum base salary for full-time classroom teachers.
 - Must be used to provide salary increases of up to \$3,000 for teachers with 10 years of teaching experience in a Florida public school.
 - Remainder may be used for instructional salary increases or increased personnel compensation costs.

Career and Adult Education 2026-27 Overview

Career and Adult Education - Total funds of \$734.7 million

- \$473.5 million in Workforce Development funds.
- \$40 million in Workforce Development Capitalization Incentive Grant Program.
- \$94.4 million in federal budget authority for the Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Act.
- \$63.3 million for Adult Basic Education federal flow-through funds.
- \$20 million for Nursing Education Program.

Florida College System 2026-27 Overview

Florida College System - Total funds of \$1.86 billion

- \$64 million to support nursing education programs, which will support those who serve the complex health care needs of our communities.
- \$38.7 million for projects and operational support.
- \$30 million for Student Success Incentive Funds.

Other Education 2026-27 Overview

Student Financial Assistance – Total funds of \$1.1 billion

- \$705 million for Florida’s Bright Futures Scholarship Program.
- \$309 million for need-based aid.
- \$18 million for Dual Enrollment Scholarship Program.
- \$2 million for Graduation Alternative to Traditional Education Scholarship Program.

Other Education 2026-27 Overview

Vocational Rehabilitation – Total Funds of \$270.2 million

- To provide employment opportunities to an estimated 45,000 Floridians in 90 field locations.

Blind Services – Total Funds of \$84.3 million

- To provide education, training and employment opportunities to 12,000 Floridians in 10 district offices.

Early Learning – Total Funds of \$1.65 billion

- To provide early education and care to an estimated 347,000 children.

Fixed Capital Outlay 2026-27 Overview

Fixed Capital Outlay – Total Funds of \$1.9 billion

- \$260.2 million for maintenance, repair, renovation and remodeling projects at charter schools.
- \$145.5 million for Special Facilities.
- \$20 million for School Safety Grant Program.
- \$11.9 million for Florida School for the Deaf and the Blind.
- \$0.8 million for Blind Services.
- \$25.8 million for Public School Projects.
- \$4.8 million for Vocational Technical Facilities.

HB 5003E – General Appropriations Implementing Bill - Education

- **Implements the 2026-27 General Appropriations Act, HB 5001E, and makes the following provisions for the 2026-27 fiscal year:**
 - Incorporates the Florida Education Finance Program (FEFP) work papers by reference for the purpose of displaying the calculations used by the Legislature in making appropriations.
 - Revises the FEFP to lower the threshold for required local effort from 90 percent to 85 percent.
 - Adjusts the Educational Enrollment Stabilization Program calculations.

SB 124 – Florida Virtual School

SB 178 – Athletics in Public K-12 Schools

- **SB 124 Florida Virtual School**
 - Eliminates priority admission for certain students.
 - Allows board of trustees to use supplemental funding and revenue from direct-support organizations for technology-based education delivery services.
 - Changes requirements for board of trustees pertaining to admission, setting performance and accountability measures, reporting on performance, and providing annual report.
- **SB 178**
 - Requires the Florida High School Athletic Association to adopt bylaws allowing a head coach to use personal funds to help student athletes with food, transportation and recovery services.
 - The head coach must report such use of personal funds to the association, and they may not exceed \$15,000 per athletic team per year.

SB 182 - Education

- **Florida Tax Credit Scholarship Program**
 - Clarifies that, when a student's scholarship account is closed, any remaining funds revert to the scholarship funding organization rather than the state.
- **School Teacher Training and Mentoring Program**
 - Establishes the School Teacher Training and Mentoring Program, which intends to allow retired teachers to mentor current classroom teachers in "D" or "F" schools.
 - Teacher mentors must have at least three years of teaching experience in PK-12 and have earned a highly effective rating on their most recent performance evaluation.
 - Authorizes a stipend of up to \$3,000 for teacher mentors and requires each mentor-mentee relationship to last one grading period.
 - The bill authorizes the use of Educational Enrichment Allocation funds under the FEFP, if available, to support the program.

HB 453 – Requirements for a Standard High School Diploma

- Modifies high school graduation requirements by allowing for marching band and Special Olympics as substitutions for standard diploma credits.
- Provides that completion of two years of marching band satisfies both the physical education and performing arts requirements for a standard high school diploma.
- Provides that a student with a disability may participate in the Special Olympics as a substitute for the physical education requirement for high school graduation. Such participation must be for one school year, as determined by the student's individualized education plan team.

HB 461 - Volunteering at Polling Locations

- Allows high school students who are registered or preregistered to vote to volunteer at polling places for community service hours that count toward meeting high school graduation or Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program award requirements.

SB 538 – Extracurricular Activities

- Amends rules for student participation in high school athletics and extracurricular activities.
- Allows district school boards to adopt policies for the use of voluntary donations and revenues from booster clubs or associations.
- Requires the donations to be used to fund athletic coaches, activity directors or sponsors of an extracurricular activity supported by the booster club or association.
- Disallows the donations to be used for severance pay or compensation.
- Expands eligibility for student participation in interscholastic or intrascholastic extracurricular activities.
 - Allows home education students to participate in activities.
 - Allows students to participate in activities in schools other than the one he or she is enrolled in, provided the school is in their school district and their school does not offer the activity.
- Requires any insurance provided by district school boards to cover all eligible students.

HB 561 – Educator Preparation and Certification

HB 572 - Ethics for Public Officers and Employees

- **HB 561 Educator Preparation and Certification**
 - Streamlines the reinstatement of expired professional educator certificates and removes barriers for teachers returning to classroom.
 - Eliminates need to retake subject area exams and provides free professional learning to educators seeking to renew or reinstate their teaching certificate.
- **SB 572 Ethics for Public Officers and Employees**
 - Includes legally recognized foster parents and foster children in the definition of “relative” within the code of ethics for public officers and employees.
 - Clarifies that section 112.3135, F.S., does not prohibit a board, council, commission or collegial body on which an elected public official serves from appointing, employing, promoting or advancing a relative who is an elected public official serving on the entity.

HB 757 – School Safety

- Requires district school safety specialists to explain the purpose, importance and proper execution of specified school safety training protocols and procedures.
- Expands participation in the Chris Hixon, Coach Aaron Feis, and Coach Scott Beigel School Guardian Program by adding public postsecondary educational institutions to the list of authorized participants.

SB 824 – School District Unimproved Real Property

- Requires school districts to submit an annual inventory of unimproved property to FDOE.
 - Unimproved property is defined as any parcel of land owned in whole or part by a district that does not contain any vertical improvements, including but not limited to buildings, permanent structures or constructed facilities.
- Requires inventory information to include:
 - Parcel identification number;
 - Acreage of the parcel;
 - Address or descriptive location of the parcel;
 - Date of acquisition of the parcel by the district;
 - Current use of the parcel; and
 - Fair market value assessed by the county property appraiser or a district-commissioned appraisal completed within the previous 24 months.
- Requires FDOE to post a statewide report on its website by December 1, 2026, and every three years thereafter.

HB 851 – Professional Learning for Instructional and School Administrative Personnel

- Requires that at least one autism-specific professional learning opportunity be provided on an annual basis to instructional personnel and school-based administrators.
- Requires training to be developed in consultation with the district's assigned Center for Autism and Related Disabilities.
- Requires training to include evidence-based practices for supporting students with autism spectrum disorder across all levels of need, including:
 - Academic instruction;
 - Behavioral supports;
 - Communication strategies; and
 - Inclusive practices.

HB 1073 – School Districts

- Creates the District School Board Members’ Bill of Rights.
- Establishes in law that district school board members have certain rights, including:
 - Free and timely access to certain district documents;
 - To consult with the district’s chief financial officer on matters related to the budget;
 - To have reasonable access to district budget and financial transaction information;
 - To request, with the permission of the superintendent or other administrative members, any lawfully available document or information from school district staff; and
 - To comment publicly during or outside of district school board meetings on any matter of district school board business, except for student and employee disciplinary hearings.
- Defines “good cause” as it relates to district school board rejection of an employee nominated for a position as any of the following:
 - The fabrication or material exaggeration of credentials or background;
 - The employee does not meet the minimum requirements for the position; and
 - The employee’s educator certificate has been revoked by another state.

HB 1201 – Student Health and Safety

- Specifies that the requirement for a school employee to complete training for the care of a student with epilepsy and seizure disorders applies to each school district employee and charter school employee (including teachers and transportation employees) who meets that criterion, as opposed to each “school employee” in current law.
- Provides that the above-referenced training is valid for five years.
- Requires each public school to display a poster that describes the basic response for a seizure event.

HB 1279 - Education

- Student Supports, Literacy and School Improvement
 - Requires a school district to notify a parent within 10 school days when a related service identified in a student's IEP is not provided as scheduled and discuss a plan for make-up services.
 - Expands the definition of an educational emergency to include designated persistently low-performing schools, thereby allowing a district school board to exercise authority over personnel contracts in selecting, placing and compensating instructional personnel to improve student performance.
 - Authorizes school districts to reserve up to 1 percent of Title I funds for specified STEM-related educational services, technologies and instructional supports.
- Acceleration and Advanced Coursework
 - Authorizes bonus funds for school districts and teachers for students' successful completion of Florida advanced courses and tests, which are aligned with bonuses offered for other advanced and career examination.
 - Specifies that the postsecondary institutions eligible to participate in the dual enrollment program are Florida public postsecondary institutions and eligible not-for-profit colleges and universities.

HB 1279 – Education (continued)

- Student Financial Aid and Tuition Policies
 - Allows eligible students to defer receipt of an initial Benacquisto Scholarship Program award for up to one year while retaining eligibility.
 - Expands resident tuition protections for individuals and their dependent children while serving outside the state as active-duty or civilian personnel for the U.S. Department of State or a Department of Defense Dependent School.
 - Specifies qualification criteria for tuition and fee exemptions for homeless students.

SB 1296 – Public Employees Relations Commission

- Amends several provisions relating to chapter 447, F.S., which governs public employee unions in Florida. The changes include revising processes, timeframes and requirements for public employee union membership, disputes and appeals.
- Requires at least 50% participation in union certification or recertification elections.
- Establishes a fast-track process to ensure teachers receive pay increases without delay.

HB 1343 - Insurance Customer Representative Licensing Qualifications

- Allows a student to use his or her Florida high school diploma to satisfy the education requirement for an insurance customer representative's license, provided the individual completed a course in insurance and personal finance as part of the curriculum.
- Requires the FDOE develop a 0.5 credit course in insurance and personal finance that is available to school districts for use beginning with the 2027-28 school year.
- The course must include a comprehensive analysis of basic property and casualty lines of insurance.

HB 1471 - Systems of Law and Terrorist Organizations

- Prohibits the state and its subdivisions from expending any monies to support a terrorist organization or accepting any funds from a terrorist organization.
- Prohibits a public school, including a charter school, school district, charter school administrators, or direct-support organization for any such school or school district from expending state or federal funds to promote, support or maintain any programs or campus activities that promote a terrorist organization or that promote a person or entity providing support to a terrorist organization.
- Prohibits awarding institutional or state grants, financial aid, scholarships, or tuition assistance to a student who promotes a domestic terrorist organization or a foreign terrorist organization during any term of enrollment.
- Requires a college or university to report to the U.S. Department of Homeland Security if a student on a student visa is promoting terrorism.

HB 5205E - Retirement

- Revises the contribution rates for each membership class and subclass of the Florida Retirement System (FRS) paid by employers participating in the FRS beginning on July 1, 2026.

HB 7031E - Taxation

- Changes the timing of the annual back-to-school sales tax holiday from the month of August to July 20–August 20, 2026.
- The sales tax holiday is for clothing, wallets, bags and footwear with a sales price of \$100 or less; school supplies with a sales price of \$50 or less; learning aids and puzzles with a sales price of \$30 or less; and personal computers and computer-related accessories with a sales price of \$1,500 or less.



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
